### New – Changes to public health measures from 9 September

Following the Premier's announcement last week, changes to public health measures from Friday 9 September include:

- Mask mandate on public and passenger transport to ease - this includes all interstate and intrastate aircraft, public transport and rideshare, and all school buses and school vehicles
- Mask wearing still required in high-risk settings such as hospitals, aged and disability care facilities, with masks encouraged for crowded indoor settings
- Isolation reduced to 5 days for people with no symptoms
- People may only enter high-risk facilities such as hospitals, residential aged care facilities and disability support accommodation facilities after 7 days from when they are identified as a COVID-19 positive case or close contact.

# ANTI VAPING

## Do you know what they're vaping?

Yançep Secondary College, like many other schools, has seen a recent increase in young people vaping.

Electronic cigarettes or e-cigarettes, often called 'vapes', are electronic devices designed to deliver vapourised liquids into the lungs. There are many different styles of vapes and types of e-liquids, or e-juices, available. Vapes come in many shapes and sizes and can be made to look like everyday items including highlighters, pens or USB memory sticks.

The biggest misunderstanding about vapes is that they are harmless compared to cigarettes. This is not true. Vapes are not safe.

## Vaping facts

Many vapes contain nicotine making them very addictive.

The nicotine in 1 vape can equal 50 cigarettes.

Vapes can contain the same harmful chemicals found in cleaning products, nail polish remover, weed killer and bug spray. They just don't put it on the pack.

Vapes can leave young people at increased risk of depression and anxiety.

Young people who vape are 3 times as likely to take up smoking cigarettes.

Vape aerosol is not water vapour.

Vaping has been linked to serious lung disease.

Vapes that contain nicotine can cause long-lasting negative effects on young people's brain development.

## Signs your child might be vaping

Tell-tale signs that your child might have started vaping include the symptoms of nicotine addiction such as feeling irritable or anxious.

## The laws around selling vapes

It is reported that young people often purchase vapes online, from retail stores or from friends and contacts in the community. However, it is illegal in WA to sell e-cigarette devices and nicotine vaping products to anyone regardless of age, unless they are prescribed by a doctor for smoking cessation purposes and obtained with a prescription from a pharmacy.

In WA e-cigarette devices and their components, whether they contain nicotine or not, cannot be sold by tobacco or general retailers. If you suspect someone is selling vapes or e-cigarettes and their components, you can report it to the Department of Health by emailing [TobaccoPolicy@health.wa.gov.au](mailto:TobaccoPolicy@health.wa.gov.au)

## Talk to your child about vaping

Whether you suspect your child is vaping or not, take the time to talk to them about vaping and help them understand the risks. Try to start the conversation in a relaxed easy-going way, be patient, and remember your goal is to have a conversation, not deliver a lecture. Importantly, have your facts ready.



FOGARTY FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIPS


## Year 11 Marine

## SunSmart Surfing Western Australia - 2022 WA School Surfing Titles




## School Grounds and Gardens

### zero2hero<sup>®</sup>






## R U OK? DAY - Week 8



Our clever Certificate III Beauty Students have now added brow waxing, brow mapping, brow tinting and lash tinting to their skillset.





Teaching staff are responsible for marking their classroom rolls and we suggest parents contact relevant classroom teachers via email or phone the schools Attendance Officer as they will be able to outline more accurately why your child was marked as 'absent'.

YSC Attendance Officers will also regularly make follow up telephone calls for any un-resolved absences. It is important to provide a reason for these to ensure your child's overall attendance data is accurate.

### PLEASE ADVISE YSC OF ANY OF THE FOLLOWING:

- If your child will be late to school
- Your child is unwell/injured for the day
- You are planning for your child to go on a holiday - Please obtain a Holiday Request Form
- To provide reasons why your child has been absent from school
- If your child needs to leave early for an appointment

**\*Note** - if you are not able to collect your child from the college and require them to leave by themselves you must record this in their student diary to ensure the teacher will dismiss them from class.

If you need to sign your child out from school early;

**\*Note** - Please call the office to advise that you are collecting your child so student services can collect them from class. If you make arrangements with your child directly, the teacher may not dismiss them from class.


